

# IN THIS ISSUE

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I forgot to mention last month that I had traveled to VT with three members of the Streaked Mountain Woodcarvers to attend the Green Mountain Wood Carvers  $32^{nd}$  Annual Exhibit. We've gone the last 3 years to promote our own show. The other day, I got a thank you note, from their president, for our [MWCA] participation in their show. While there, I got to visit awhile with Pete LeClair and participate in one of his favorite past times, people watching. He pointed out one fella that would make an ideal 'model' for a caricature carving. In fact we saw several likely subjects. He says this is one of the ways he gets ideas for his carvings. It's always an enjoyable day, seeing what others are doing and getting a chance to visit with other carvers that I only get to see once a year, plus a few I hadn't seen yet this year.

I received a request for the identity of a wood carver. The only info the person had was that the carver's initials on the bottom of the goose, are CAP. He thought the man was in the Rockland area 25-30 years ago. He wanted to know who he was, if he's still in business, and, if so, where. I haven't been able to find anything out from any of the people I've asked, so I'll put it out to the membership. Please let me know if you have any idea who it might be. I've made some more of the wooden covers for my carving knives. A couple of people, myself included, have had some rusting problems with using pine, so I've switched to basswood. However a 'new' problem has arisen with the glue used. I used some of the fairly new' Titebond II' glue, as it's supposed to be stronger and more water resistant. After gluing the wood together and allowing a day for it to dry, I put the knives in their new 'homes'. A couple days later, when I went to use one of them, the blade had surface rust on the edges. The other knife did also. I'm not sure if it didn't dry thoroughly because of the high humidity we've had or the glue was the culprit [or both]. However, after drying them for several days in my oven [gas stove with pilot light], there doesn't appear to be any further damage. Although, I did put some wax into sheath after the prolonged drying, and this may have helped. I'll probably use epoxy from now on. I mention this so others won't damage their carving knives. I'm still not sure exactly what caused the rusting, but it's probably a good idea to check your knives periodically, especially after making a new case.

While at the show and talking with one of our 'southern' members, George Calef, I learned that he is supposed to have an article published in the next issue of 'Wood Carving Illustrated'. It's always a pleasure to chat with him at the show, as that's about the only time I see him. I think it is really great that one of our members will be getting national recognition this way. He was saying he'd submitted the article a year ago, but hadn't heard anything, so had just about given up when they called him with the 'news'.

This year the soap carving didn't prove to be as popular. There was only one youngster on Satuday and 5 on Sunday, and they were in the last hour of the show. I guess having lots of soap on hand this year proved to be a jinx.

Enjoy the foliage that will too soon be evident. Hope to see many of you again soon.







